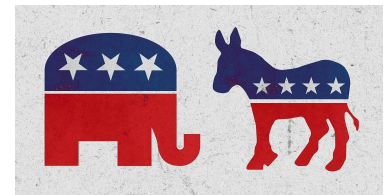
## INSTRUCTIONS:

- Name the types of electoral reform that are discussed.

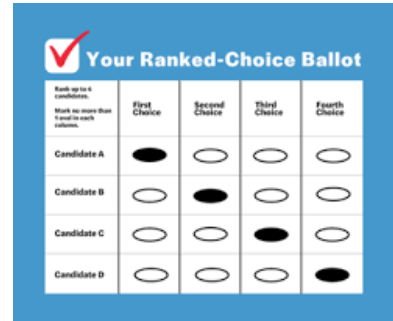


- What are three challenges with our current SMDP system?

- What are some of the benefits of ranked-choice voting?

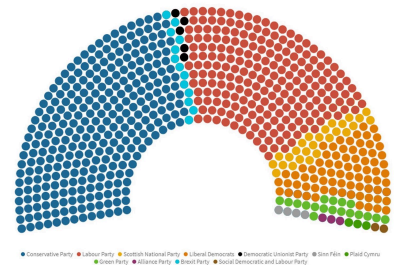


- Which California cities currently use ranked-choice voting?
